

Anjum Moudgil on target to win Silver at ISSF World Cup, Mexico



GoSports Foundation shooter, Anjum Moudgil, fought tricky wind conditions to win her First World Cup Medal. The 24-year-old shot 454.2 in the 45-shot final to clinch a silver medal in the women's 50m Rifle (3P) event at the ongoing ISSF World Cup in Mexico. It was Anjum's first appearance in a World Cup Final and she credits her coach Deepali Deshpande who has worked very hard with her.

Anjum set her personal best in the qualifying round and was leading after the second 5-shot prone position series. She was also 0.9 points clear of German world number one Jolyn Beer at the end of the series. However, she lost her lead after the 10th shot of the last standing series to ultimately finish behind former junior world champion Ruijiao Pei of China.

Anjum Moudgil is currently being supported by GoSports Foundation under Rahul Dravid Mentorship Programme to which we are partners. She will be next seen in action at Gold Coast 2018 Commonwealth Games and we at ASM Technologies hope for another sterling performance in Australia.

Anjum Moudgil on target at the Commonwealth Shooting Championships



Shooter Anjum Moudgil shot 248.7 in women's 10m air rifle event to win a silver medal at the 2017 Commonwealth Shooting Championship in Australia, and paired that with a bronze medal in the prone event. It is a remarkable feat considering Anjum was sixth after the qualification round. The 23-year-old's efforts in Australia helped her clinch her first senior medal at a major international shooting event. Anjum is a resident of Chandigarh and has been part of the foundation's programmes since the year 2014, when she was one of 6 shooters selected to undergo a workshop with Abhinav Bindra. Under the watchful eyes of both Bindra and world record holder Suma Shirur, Anjum developed her craft and is considered one of India's brightest prospects in her sport. She is one among 19 other elite athletes as part of the Rahul Dravid Athlete Mentorships.

Anjum has received support towards the purchase of her rifle and ammunition; international tournament expenses, and access to mental conditioning sessions. This year, she had a stint at the Abhinav Bindra Targeting Performance Centre for high performance training in Chandigarh. We are very proud of Anjum's achievement at Australia and happy to play a significant part in her success.
